The Children's Board of Hillsborough County, in partnership with the Tampa Metropolitan Area YMCA and Brandon Sports and Aquatic Center, provides mobile swim lessons and water safety education in Hillsborough County at no cost. Water safety is a community-wide issue. Help engage the entire community and keep community and keep children safe around water by becoming an advocate.

Help Prevent Drowning

- NEVER leave children alone near any standing water.
- ASSIGN an adult "water watcher" who is committed to actively supervising the pool area. This means they may not talk on a cell phone, read a book or otherwise be distracted.
- Inexperienced swimmers and non-swimmers should WEAR a Coast Guard approved life jacked around water.
- Children should STAY AWAY from pool drains, pipes and other openings to avoid entrapments.
- ENROLL children in Water Safety Education and Mobile Swim Lessons
 As an adult or caregiver, become educated in
- CPR/AED.Put up fences if you have a backyard pool.
- Have door alarms installed to alert someone if a door leading to an outdoor pool is opened.

Amanda Boyd's 3-year-old made progression in just a few days. "She's been doing very well," Boyd said. "She's floating on her back longer."

In the time it takes to answer a phone call, a child can become submerged underwater and lose consciousness. That's how fast a drowning can happen. Drowning can occur nearly anywhere with water: pools, ponds, culverts, bathtubs, even buckets.

Teaching children how to be safe around water is one of the most important life skills parents can help to provide.

Mobile Swim Lessons

Mobile swim lessons are offered in 45-minute classes, Monday-Friday, for one week. The swim lesson portion of the program will serve children ages 3-14 years old.

Water Safety and Hands Only CPR

During mobile swim lessons, valuable water safety and hands only CPR education will be provided to parents/caregivers. This portion of the program will focus on everything from important water safety tips to recognizing an emergency and how to give chest compressions. We will also introduce and provide a brief overview of an AED (automated external defibrillator) for parents/caregivers. These courses vary in length but teach people how to provide potential lifesaving care until medical help arrives and takes over.

"In Florida, there is water everywhere, so teaching them to swim is a concern for us." - Aimee Jennings

Mobile Swim FAQs

How do I sign up for mobile swim lessons? Properties interested in offering the program at their location, may contact Amanda Walker for more information and next steps at (813)224-9622, ext. 1278 or amanda walker@tampaymca.org. Families interested in bringing the program to their property, must first contact their property management team and share their interest. The property manager can then reach out to the program contact listed above for more information and next steps.

How much do the mobile swim lessons cost? The lessons are offered at no cost to residents through generous grant funding from the Children's Board.

When will the mobile swim lessons be held? Typically, between 10 a.m.-3 p.m., though time slots may vary by property.

Are the mobile swim lifeguards and instructors certified? Yes, all with nationally recognized certifications.

Who can participate in water safety education, and when? Anyone 3 years and older, including parents and caregivers.

Will classes be held during inclement weather? Are there make-up lessons? Both the Tampa YMCA and Brandon Sports and Aquatic Center will follow strict safety protocols regarding weather. If lightning and/or severe weather appears within an 6-mile radius of the program, participants and instructors will exit the pool. If meeting room space is available participants will move indoors for the remainder of their class time for water safety education. If a swim lesson is cancelled, make-up lessons will not be available.

Comments: Normal growth observed

Positive results were noted following treatment applied on 2/12/2019 targeting invasive Torpedograss within the littoral shelf and along the perimeter of Pond #2. Native Gulf Spikerush remains and will be promoted. Pond #2 will be monitored for any Torpedograss re-growth or algae associated with the decomposition cycle of the Torpedograss.

Comments: Treatment in progress

Pond #4 was treated for submersed Babytears development during our recent visit on 2/14/2019 and may require 14-21 days for positive results to be evident. Once treated Babytears will detach from the bottom sediments and float throughout the pond as it decomposes. Monitoring will continue for any re-growth or algae associated with decomposing submersed vegetation.







Comments: Requires attention

Pond #8 was treated during our recent visit on 1/29/19 for algae development, which had displayed short lived results as the algae has regrowth visible during inspection. Treatment will be performed during our upcoming maintenance visit as algae con only be targeted every 14 days per regulatory label.

Comments: Treatment in progress

Pond #10 displayed positive results of treatment targeting Torpedograss, which was applied on 1/29/2019. Minor native Submersed Slender Spikerush was identified within Pond #10 and will be monitored and treated as necessary to prevent any further development.







Comments: Normal growth observed

Pond #11 was treated during our recent visit on 1/29/2019 targeting invasive shoreline weeds identified as Torpedograss, Alligatorweed, and Pennywort. Positive results were noted, but re-treatment may be required to target the Alligatorweed. Minor algae identified, likely a result of the decomposing shoreline weeds.

Comments: Treatment in progress

Treatment was applied during our recent visit on 1/29/2019 targeting shoreline Torpedograss, which had displayed positive results during inspection. Pond #9 will be monitored for any new development of invasive weeds, algae, or submersed weeds and treated on identification.







Comments: Site looks good

Positive results were noted as the Torpedograss was loosing its green chlorophyll and beginning to start the decomposition cycle. Treatment was applied on 1/29/2019 targeting shoreline Torpedograss. Debris was removed from inside the storm drain during inspection.

Comments: Normal growth observed

Pond #23 was targeted for algae development on 2/12/2019 and had displayed positive results during inspection. Shoreline Torpedograss was also treated with good results. Treatment was provided behind the weir to maintain a buffer of non vegetation around it to stay in compliance with storm water infrastructure inspections.







Comments: Normal growth observed

Pond #24 looked good during inspection. Positive results were noted as the Torpedograss was visibly decomposing from treatment applied on 2/12/2019. No inorganic debris was noted within Pond #24 during inspection.

Comments: Normal growth observed

Pond #26 was treated for minor algae development on 2/12/2019 and had displayed positive results as of inspection date. Moderate amounts of submersed Hydrilla were noted within Pond #26, which will require treatment to be performed during our upcoming scheduled visit.

Panther Trace CDD I Inspection Report

2/18/2019

Management Summary

Overall, the ponds within the Panther Trace CDD I have responded well to our initial maintenance treatments targeting invasive weeds, algae, and submersed vegetation. During our initial visit it was noted that Torpedograss was the most prevalent invasive weed throughout the community as it had taken over within Littoral areas, shorelines, pond wetland buffers, and within the ditch/swale through the community. Secondly, submersed weeds were present including Babytears, Slender Spikerush, Ludwigia, and Hydrilla, which are all native besides the highly invasive Hydrilla. Treatment for submersed weeds may require 30-60 days as the systemic properties of the herbicide requires long exposure times. Submersed weeds were identified within Ponds 4, #10, #23, and #26 during inspection. Ponds #2 and #11 will continue to be monitored and treated as necessary depending on the results of the recent treatment. Alligatorweed within Pond #11 will most likely need re-treatment as results were minimal. Lastly, algae was only identified within Pond #8 during inspection, which will require treatment to be performed during our upcoming maintenance visits. Native Gulf Spikerush remains within the littoral shelf of Pond #2 and will be promoted. Minimal native aquatic plants were identified during inspection.

Hydrilla, identified within Pond #26, is a multi-branched perennial herb that is rooted, but often seen floating as it can reproduce through fragmentation. Introduced to Florida in the 1950's Hydrilla has become one of the most invasive weeds growing in the shallowest and deepest parts of Florida's lakes reaching stem lengths of over 30 feet. It crowds out native vegetation and forms dense canopies lowering the oxygen levels causing an anoxic environment and providing habitat for mosquito larva. Treatment for Hydrilla is a priority as spreading throughout the community through fragmentation, runners, tubers, and buds may occur if not treated.


Midge flies or non-biting mosquitoes are insects belonging to the large Diptera order, which includes an estimated 1,000,000 different species of flying insects. Typically, we see two species of midge flies within storm water retention ponds Chironomidae (blood midge) and Chaoboridae (phantom midge). Usually seen in natural areas clinging to vegetation nearby the water source they hatched from Midges are short lived and typically are understood to have no feeding apparatus and only live an adult life to mate. In developed areas with storm water retention ponds Midge flies have little vegetation to cling to and will be seen covering the screens of lanais. There is no danger from Midge flies as they do not harbor disease like mosquitoes and are mostly an annoyance because of their masses. Midge flies typically reproduce in masses due to lack of predation from fish. Either there is a lack in populations of fish or the fish cannot reach the larva, which hide in the soils and can live in anoxic environments, which fish cannot.

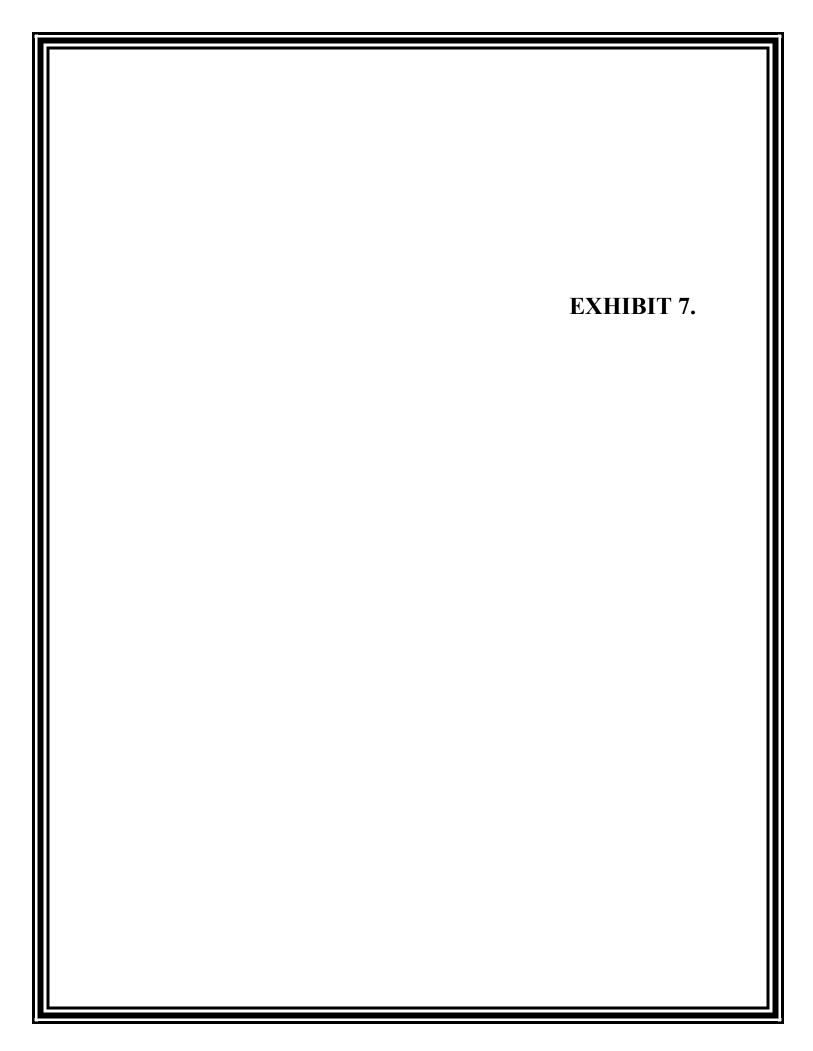
When native vegetation is planted within storm water retention ponds they provide habitat for other desirable native wildlife such as fish, birds, invertebrates, and dragon flies which will feed on mosquito. Native vegetation will take root into the banks and provide sediment stability to control erosion and accumulation. This vegetation also provides a border to prevent unwanted debris, grass clippings, leaves, fertilizers, and other items which would cause excessive nutrient spikes within the pond. There were very few native plants within the community identified during inspection. Native aquatic planting proposals will be forthcoming and will target priority ponds based on our observations and the boards recommendations. ASI would be happy to attend the next board meeting to discuss priority ponds that would highly benefit from native aquatic plantings. Based on the inspection report Pond #2 and #4 would benefit greatly from native aquatic plantings.

Recommendations/Action Items

- Routine Maintenance.
- Monitor all ponds for Algal growth and target on contact.
- Treat all sites for invasive vegetation during our routine visits.
- Promote native vegetation throughout the community.
- Treat algae within Pond #8
- Monitor and treat submersed weeds within Ponds #4, #10, #23, and #26.
- Treat any remaining grasses within Ponds #2 and #11.

For your review, below are landscape maintenance related items completed for the week of 2/11/19:

- 1. Mow, edge, line trim, blow common and ponds throughout common areas completed week. (Note: Common area St. Augustine and Bahia mowing shifts to a bi-weekly cycle effective November 5. Weekly mowing schedule resumes in March 2019)
- 2. Removal of trash, litter, debris, and signage along Panther Trace Blvd. and entrances including pond shorelines. Animal removal from playground area.
- 3. Pool/ Clubhouse detail as needed.
- 4. Magnolia leaf drop removal (on-going).
- 5. Ornamental grass cutbacks.
- 6. Select pruning along Panther Trace Blvd.
- 7. Round-up weed control
- 8. Note: Florida Automated Weather Network (FAWN) reports rainfall for the period 2/11 2/18 was a cumulative 0.43 inches from the Balm weather station covering the Balm-Riverview area. The last significant amount of rain recorded at the Balm station was .28 inches on Wednesday 2/13. Soil temperatures reported as an average 69.33
- 9. Panther Trace Weather Station (KFLRIVER86) reporting for Monday 2/18. Max rainfall during the week was .29" on Wednesday 2/13, with a cumulative rainfall total of .60" for the period 2/11 2/18. Temperature for the upcoming week are projected to continue to be above average.
